Special Aspects

The 90th Glenolden, PA Christmas Bird Count (part of the 112th Audubon CBC) was held Saturday, December 17, 2011. This year 61 registered field observers ventured out in 23 parties logging 172 party-hours and 419 miles. Eleven feeder watchers contributed good numbers as well, including a Red-shouldered Hawk!

The weather was cooperative. Sun in the early morning quickly gave way to overcast skies as a cold front pushed through. Riding the front were thousands of geese in large skeins high in the sky. This presented a compiling dilemma as several parties reported high numbers as they flew north to south. Duplicate counting was inevitable. Rather to try & figure this out I chose to add them all figuring many were duplicates but many were missed. Consequently a new high count was set for Snow Goose (2115) beating the previous high of 1856 in 2008. The 14824 Canada Goose count was not quite a record.

Highlights:

Snowy Owl at the PECO plant in Eddystone. Inaccessible to the public, the bird was identified and photographed by game commission officers monitoring Peregrine Falcons. It was confirmed to be present on count day. This species has been found on 4 counts 1937-1971 and was a count week bird in 1949 and 1980.

Virginia Rail at Tinicum was a bird known to be present and deftly picked out on CBC day by the Tinicum Philly team. Eastern Towhees were everywhere. The count of 136 individuals smashed the previous record of 84 set in 2005. I could find no explanation other than the warm winter.

This year we logged 85 species on CBC day; below the 90 from last year and way below the historical average of around 100. There were two "count week" birds: Merlin and the Northern Shrike at Tinicum which I think was seen every day this winter except CBC day despite heroic effort by the Philly team.

Other highs were 13 Wild Turkey (8 in 2007); 3 Peregrine Falcons (tied 3 in 2007); 205 Red-bellied Woodpeckers (smashing 163 in 2005); 21 Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers (not quite smashing the previous record of 20 in 1981).

Why was the species count so low? Several not uncommon winter visitors are absent this winter. Most notable was zero Redbreasted Nuthatches. This was the first miss for this species since 1967. Pine Siskins and, in stark contrast to last year, Black-capped Chickadees were not seen. Examples of other species that might be expected but were not found are Ring-necked Duck, Northern Shoveler, Am Wigeon, Common Goldeneye, Northern Harrier, Horned Lark, Savannah Sparrow and White-crowned Sparrow.

Unfortunately one Ruddy Duck (high 20,188 in 1956) and one American Kestrel continued their downward trends.

Details of species counts can be found in the list. One matter of explanation: since the first CBC was in 1900 count #1 was Dec 1900, #2 Dec 1901 etc. On the table max/count refer to # individuals/count number so e.g. count 102 was Dec 2001. The number of counts the species was reported can be deceiving. For example Northern Flicker can be reported as such or as Northern Flicker (yellow shafted) and these are not combined in the totals!!

One more sort of editorial comment. Try perusing the high counts and pay special attention to the numbers from the mid-50s to the early 80s and compare them to current counts. Where have all the birds gone? Sprawl is the immediate reaction and I would suppose is the major contributor. Whatever the reason it gives me pause.

Detailed historical data for the CBC can be found at Christmasbirdcount.org. The count code for the Glenolden (Delaware County) is PAGL.
