The 97th Glenolden Christmas Bird Count part of the 117th National Audubon CBC was held Saturday December 17, 2016. Our field teams and feeder watchers covered a 15 mile diameter circle centered in Media, Delaware County, PA.

The big story of this year's CBC has to be the weather. Actually we have been pretty lucky weather-wise in recent years. Except for count number 110 which was rescheduled to1/2/10 because of a 22" snowfall on the scheduled count day in December we have to go back to 1996 when there was "heavy morning snow" and 1991 when there was "steady morning rain" to find dates that precipitation impacted the count.

We had a little bit of everything through the day. Conditions can vary within our circle but I suspect our experience in Swarthmore was pretty typical. Our day started at 4:30 am with owling in Little Crum Creek Park in a steady moderate snowfall. It was cold, 26 degrees, but windless and quiet in the early morning hour. The ambient light was just enough to highlight the fresh snow on the tree branches. It was a beautiful scene. Somewhat to our surprise we managed to call in two pairs of screech owls with our recording. Maybe the day wouldn't be so bad after all. But it went downhill from there. By the time we finished in the park the snow had turned to freezing rain with only an inch or two of wet snow on the ground. We were able to drive around town to our usual stops but found no more owls except one very distant great horned owl calling. When we stopped at Dunkin Donuts at 7:00 the roads were icing up which created no small amount of concern but by the time we left a half hour later we were driving in wet slush and a light rain. That's pretty much how the day continued with intermittent light rain and drizzle. The snow on the trees was replaced with ice crystals, also guite pretty, but we had to take care walking on the slopes in the wet woods. We are kind of in the lowlands of the county in Swarthmore so I suspect the snow and ice may have lasted a bit longer "up-county" but I heard more comments about the wet than the ice from our area captains.

Despite the weather the area captains were up to the task and every one of the expected 26 parties went out-at least for a while. We had 54 field observers in those 26 parties and 9 folks kept an eye on 6 feeders for a total of 63 participants. This contrasts with 96 participants on last year's count. However the past 10 year average number of participants is 73-so not bad for a lousy weather day.

As expected party-hours were down (128.6) relative to the previous 10 year average (172) and the total number of birds counted (16,807) was down 40% from the past 10 year average (27,472).

Despite this we managed a species count that was average!! Hooray! It's a testament to everyone's hard work. We tallied 88 species on count day. Although somewhat lower than the past 10 year average (92) it is one better than last year's species count (87) and one less than our 2014 count (89). Adding the four species noted during count week (snow goose, lesser scaup, common goldeneye, fish crow) we had a total of 92 species. No new species were added to our grand total which stands at 195.

Somewhat surprisingly we did have one species that tied a previous high. **Merlins** have a reputation for being tough little guys and the weather didn't seem to bother them. Three **Merlins** were found: Smedley Park, Merion Golf Club and the Havertown area. This tied the previous count of 3 in 2002. **Merlin** has been reported on 24 previous counts.

Speaking of raptors the 5 **Northern Harriers** were a nice find. Only 1 or 2 per CBC have been recorded over the past 10 years.

The most unusual bird of the count was an **orange-crowned warbler** well described by Jim McConnell. He got good long looks in the Delco portion of Heinz refuge. Jim has been birding in the area for a number of years. This is his first CBC. Welcome Jim! Also not too shabby was the **lesser scaup** found by Al Guarente at Crum Reservoir on count week. That was probably a one day wonder as it was not recorded subsequently.
